<b>Behavioral Health Aide</b>	<p><b>Behavioral Health Aide (BHA)</b>- Behavioral Health Aides must have completed 60 hours or equivalent of college credit or may substitute one year of relevant employment and/or responsibility in the care of children with complex emotional needs for up to two years of college experience, and: (i) must have successfully completed the specialized training and education curriculum provided by the ODMHSAS; and (ii) must be supervised by a bachelor's level individual with a minimum of two years case management experience.</p>	<p>(g) <b>Behavioral Health Aide (BHA)</b>. BHAs are defined as follows:            (1) Behavioral Health Aides must have completed 60 hours or equivalent of college credit; or            (2) may substitute one year of relevant employment and/or responsibility in the care of children with complex emotional needs for up to two years of college experience; and            (3) must have successfully completed the specialized training and education curriculum provided by the ODMHSAS; and            (4) must be supervised by a bachelor's level individual with a minimum of two years case management experience; and            (5) treatment plans must be overseen and approved by a LBHP; and            (6) must function under the general direction of a LBHP and/or systems of care team, with a LBHP available at all times to provide back up, support, and/or consultation.</p>
<b>Behavioral Health Case Manager</b>	<p><b>Behavioral Health Case Manager (BHCM)</b>- Certified by ODMHSAS as a Behavioral Health Case Manager.</p>	<p><b>Behavioral Health Case Manager (BHCM)</b>- For case management services to be compensable by SoonerCare, the case manager performing the service must maintain current case management certification from the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services.</p>

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<p><b>Behavioral Health Rehabilitation Specialist</b></p>	<p><b>Behavioral Health Rehabilitation Specialist (BHRS)-</b> 1.) Bachelor or master degree in a behavioral health related field including, but not limited to, psychology, social work, occupational therapy, human resources/services counseling, human developmental psychology, gerontology, early childhood development, chemical dependency, rehabilitative services, sociology, school guidance and counseling, education, criminal justice, family studies, earned from a regionally accredited college or university recognized by the United States Department of Education. 2.) A current license as a registered nurse in the state where services are provided.</p>	<p><b>c) Behavioral Health Rehabilitation Specialists (BHRS).</b> BHRSs are defined as follows:            (1) Bachelor or master degree in a behavioral health related field including, psychology, social work, occupational therapy, human resources/services counseling, human developmental psychology, gerontology, early childhood development, chemical dependency, rehabilitative services, sociology, school guidance and counseling, education, criminal justice family studies, earned from a regionally accredited college or university recognized by the United States Department of Education; or            (2) Bachelor or master degree that demonstrates the individual completed and passed equivalent college level course work to meet the degree requirements of (1) of this subsection, as reviewed and approved by OHCA or its designated agent; or            (3) A current license as a registered nurse in the state where services are provided; or            (4) Certification as an Alcohol and Drug Counselor. They are allowed to provide substance abuse rehabilitative treatment to those with alcohol and/or other drug dependencies or addictions as a primary or secondary DSM-IV Axis I diagnosis; or            (5) Current certification as a Behavioral Health Case Manager from ODMHSAS as described in OAC 317:30-5-585(1).</p>
<p><b>Employment Consultant</b></p>	<p><b>Employment Consultant (EC)-</b> (i) have a high school diploma or equivalent; and (ii) successful completion of Job Coach training.</p>	<p>Not Applicable</p>

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<p><b>Family Support Provider / Family Support And Training Provider</b></p>	<p><b>Family Support Provider (FSP)</b>- (i) have a high school diploma or equivalent; (ii) be 21 years of age and have successful experience as a family member of a child or youth with serious emotional disturbance, or a minimum of 2 years experience working with children with serious emotional disturbance or be equivalently qualified by education in the human services field or a combination of work experience and education with one year of education substituting for one year of experience (preference is given to parents or care givers of child with SED); (iii) successful completion of Family Support Training according to a curriculum approved by the ODMHSAS prior to providing the service; (iv) pass OSBI and OKDHS child abuse check as well as adult abuse registry and motor vehicle screens; and (v) receive ongoing and regular supervision by a person meeting the qualifications of an MHP. Allopathic or Osteopathic Physicians with a current license and board certification in psychiatry or board eligible in the state in which services are provided, or a current resident in psychiatry. 2.) Practitioners with a license to practice in the state in which services are provided or those actively and regularly receiving board approved supervision, and extended supervision by a fully licensed clinician if board's supervision requirement is met but the individual is not yet licensed, to become licensed by one of the following licensing boards: (A) Psychology; (B) Social Work (clinical specialty only); (C) Professional Counselor; (D) Marriage and Family Therapist; (E) Behavioral Practitioner; or (F) Alcohol and Drug Counselor. 3.) Advanced Practice Nurse (certified in a psychiatric mental health specialty), licensed as a registered nurse with a current certification of recognition from the board of nursing in the state in which services are provided.</p>	<p>(a) <b>Licensed Behavioral Health Professional (LBHPs).</b> LBHPs are defined as follows:          (1) Allopathic or Osteopathic Physicians with a current license and board certification in psychiatry or board eligible in the state in which services are provided, or a current resident in psychiatry practicing as described in OAC 317:30-5-2.          (2) Practitioners with a license to practice in the state in which services are provided or those actively and regularly receiving board approved supervision, and extended supervision by a fully licensed clinician if board's supervision requirement is met but the individual is not yet licensed, to become licensed by one of the licensing boards listed in (A) through (F) of this paragraph. The exemptions from licensure under 59 '1353(4) (Supp. 2000) and (5), 59 '1903(C) and (D) (Supp. 2000), 59 '1925.3(B) (Supp. 2000) and (C), and 59 '1932(C) (Supp. 2000) and (D) do not apply to Outpatient Behavioral Health Services. <p style="text-align: center;"><b>Peer Recovery Support Specialist / Community Recovery Support Specialist</b></p>	<p><b>Peer Recovery Support Specialist (PRSS)-</b> Successful completion of the ODMHSAS Recovery Support Provider Training and Test to be credentialed.</p>	<p>(e) <b>Community Recovery Support Specialist (RSS).</b> RSSs are defined as follows:          (1) The community/recovery support worker must meet the following criteria:          (A) High School diploma or GED;          (B) Minimum one year participation in local or national member advocacy or knowledge in the area of behavioral health recovery;          (C) current or former member of behavioral health services; and          (D) successful completion of the ODMHSAS Recovery Support Provider Training and Test.</p>

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<p><b>Treatment Professional / Alcohol And Other Drug Treatment Professional</b></p>	<p><b>Treatment Professional (TP)-</b> In accordance with OAC 450:18, any of the following will meet requirements for a "treatment professional": (1) Oklahoma Licensed Alcohol and Drug Counselor (LADC) or under supervision for a LADC; or, (2) Oklahoma Certified Alcohol and Drug Counselor (CADC ) under supervision of a LADC or under supervision to attain certification as a CADC; or, (3) Other facility staff who are Oklahoma licensed health professionals, including LSW, LCSW, LPC, LBP, LMFT, M.D., D.O.s, APN, or actively and regularly receiving board approved supervision to become licensed including those who are receiving extended supervision by a fully licensed clinician if board's supervision requirement is met but the individual is not yet licensed and for whom the facility has on file: (a) a letter from the applicable licensing Board to verify the Board considers the specific licensed health professional or individual under supervision to become a licensed health professional to be qualified as an addictions treatment professional, or (b) internal privileging documents to verify the Oklahoma licensed health professional or individual under supervision to become a licensed health professional meets criteria as an addiction treatment specialist as specifically defined by the facility's policy and procedure and provided the facility's policy requires specific documentation of training in addictions assessment and treatment through academic course work on addictions and/or continuing education events provided by addictions treatment professionals recognized in Oklahoma.</p>	<p><b>(b) Alcohol and other Drug Treatment Professionals (AODTPs).</b> AODTPs are defined as follows:          (1) Licensed to practice as an Alcohol and Drug Counselor in the state in which services are provided, or those actively and regularly receiving board approved supervision to become licensed;          (2) Certified as an Advanced Alcohol and Drug Counselor as recognized and approved by an ODMHSAS AOD treatment certifying and/or licensing body;          (3) Certified as an Alcohol and Drug Counselor as recognized and approved by an ODMHSAS AOD treatment certifying and/or licensing body; or          (4) A Licensed Behavioral Health Professional with a current license, or those actively and regularly receiving board approved supervision to become licensed, and extended supervision by a fully licensed clinician if board's supervision requirement is met but the individual is not yet licensed, to practice who can demonstrate competency in the area of alcohol and drug counseling and treatment.</p>
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
